Right now, the plant in the small plastic bottle represents the people WE are helping, those who are homeless or struggling with addiction. In that small bottle, they're in a contained, fragile environment. They have potential, but they need care, nourishment, and stability to survive. That's where we come in we are the one's watering them, giving them what they need to start growing again: support, encouragement, and resources. Once their roots begin to take hold, meaning they start believing in themselves, finding purpose, walking with the Lord and developing stability, they can be "transplanted" into a new environment. That might be a job, or housing, it's somewhere they can continue to grow with a bit more freedom and independence.

Eventually, as they flourish and become stronger, they're ready to be "planted" into the world, living independently, contributing to their community, and growing on their own. Just like a gardener, our role is to nurture that early growth, to create conditions where life can take root again. We don't force it; we cultivate it. And once the roots are strong, that growth continues long after they've moved beyond our care.

Over the course of 24 hours on a park bench, I gained something I didn't expect, perspective. Sitting outside through a cold, windy night, I caught a glimpse of what more than 750,000 Americans experience every day. Even with conversations around me, loneliness crept in. The temperature dropped to 45 degrees, and despite wearing jackets and blankets, I couldn't stop shivering. I didn't sleep for even a minute. By morning, my body was exhausted, and my mind was foggy. The idea of working, finding food, or even functioning seemed impossible.

Let me be clear, I still have no idea what it truly means to be homeless. I could go home afterward to warmth, safety, and rest. But even that single night reminded me how fragile stability can be and how easily comfort can turn into survival.

What impacted me most were the conversations. Dozens of people stopped to talk, many sharing a similar message: look at others with empathy, not judgment. It's easy to form opinions about someone based on appearances, what they wear, where they stand, or what they've lost. But every person has a

story, often shaped by pain, trauma, and circumstance. This experience humbled me deeply. It reminded me why the House of Hope exists: to ensure that no one

faces the cold, fear, or isolation of homelessness alone. We provide more than housing, we offer dignity, healing, and a path forward.

We will continue participating in this event to raise awareness for those who often go unseen. My hope is that it encourages others to look beyond assumptions, to see with eyes of empathy, not judgment, and to remember that compassion is where real

change begins.

My question is do we really truly look at others with Love,
Compassion, and Empathy all the time or only when it is convenient for us to do so?
